Marin Families Fight Climate Change by Sharing Trips with SchoolPool Marin

SCHOOLPOOLMARIN.ORG is an exciting on-line referral service that offers Marin County families trip-sharing matches. Introduced in 2010 by Marin County's Safe Routes to Schools program, SchoolPool offers parents the ability to connect with each other to organize carpool, walking, bicycling and bus trips for their children to and from school and now to their other activities besides school.

In its first year, SchoolPool Marin reduced the number of vehicle trips and increased the number of students walking, bicycling, and taking a carpool or bus to and from school. The program enabled a reduction of 635,000 vehicle-miles traveled in Marin and a decrease of more than 260 metric tons of greenhouse-gas emissions!

REGISTERING IS EASY AND FREE. Families are turning to **SchoolPoolMarin.org** as a fast and convenient way to make a direct impact on their own carbon footprint while saving time and money and teaching their children healthy travel habits. Once a parent/guardian registers on-line, the site's trip-share function provides a match list of other interested families who travel a similar route to their school or other activities. Parents can then get in touch with each other to discuss carpooling, walking, biking or introducing their kids to be bus buddies.

SCHOOLPOOL MARIN PROVIDES TIPS AND INCENTIVES for getting started and maintaining SchoolPools and offers families Jamba Juice and Peet's gift cards for participating. Schools with the highest levels of "green travel" are eligible to win cash awards in the yearly Green Ways to School Challenge from Safe Routes to Schools. Parents and school employees can even join the effort by going to **SchoolPoolMarin.org** to find commute partners to work on **511 Rideshare**.
