Safe Routes presentation (Jen Shriber, SR2S/Parametrix & Gwen Froh, SR2S/MCBC)

See the attached presentation.

The presentation included excerpts from the 2023 evaluation report showing progress countywide in maintaining and increasing active and shared trips to school. It then showed results from Mill Valley, comparing the percentage of students walking and biking to the percentage of students that live within walking and biking distance. Most Mill Valley Schools are doing exceptionally well, with over 50% green trips and Mill Valley Middle School generating 65% green trips. Strawberry Point is the exception with 72% still driving their children to school. Details can be found in the presentation.

Discussion (Wendi Kallins, SR2S)

Strategies to maintain and/or increase green trips

Bria Larson: For Park ES - Miller/E. Blithedale crossing still tricky, crossing guard was recently removed. Some parents unhappy with this. Possibly put up flags at intersection? Additionally, some of the steps/lanes/paths near the school are not ideal due to blind corners or no good place to cross.

Steve Mnich: Near Strawberry Point ES – How do we prioritize schools with high vehicle rates for infrastructure improvements? Ricardo has some high danger areas with a lot of traffic. Some issues include narrow lanes, lack of sidewalks in some areas, and the sun in driver's eyes at certain times of the year. There is a lot of vegetation overgrowth, too. Potential to put some temporary barriers up near the first 2-3 houses that are on the first and second block of Ricardo heading downhill?

Langston Hazen: Speaking to Steve Mnich's comments – the homeowner with a lot of overgrown vegetation has been contacted. Lots of issues, and not a lot of good solutions, but we're aware of them and we're working on them.

Alex Pocaro: Parent of new kindergartener at Tam Valley ES – feels very unsafe when biking with their daughter to TVES. There is a lot of conflict between people who are trying to get to work and the families that are trying to get to school using the suggested routes. On Marin Avenue it is narrow, no sidewalks, curves, feels unsafe. Possible solutions – sharrows? Lights? Anything other than nothing is a good start.

Wendi: we've looked at Marin Avenue and adding bike lanes is not an option, but any kind of traffic calming or simply putting in sharrow like on Sycamore can be looked at.

Matthew Hartzell WTB/TAM: 35% of students at MVMS bike to school, but that number drops to 8% at Tam HS. Perhaps this is because of the lack of secure bike parking? Spaces for 100 bikes, but often 125 or more are observed. Those extra bike block the

emergency exits sometimes. Additionally, Ebikes take up three times the space of a regular bike. Tam HS should consider banning Super 88 Ebikes. MVMS also needs more bike parking; current capacity is 190 bikes, but 200 are parked there every day. MVSD doing a new master plan - encouraged to look at adding bike parking.

Tam HS- further investigate increasing safety corridor along Almonte.

Updates

Street Smarts (David Parisi, Parametrix)

New Issues

(Wendi Kallins, SR2S)

Tam Valley – Shoreline south of the Junction does not have a safe walkway. Can drainage ditch be covered to accommodate active travel?

Mike Woolard with TAM HS talked about new construction on campus coming up as well as talking about safety issues for bicyclists, pedestrians, and additional bike parking is under consideration. Next steps

- Strawberry Pt. look at infrastructure and overgrown bushes along Ricardo
- Park Work on overgrowth along pathways and cut-throughs that impact visibility.
- MVSD School District encouraged to look at increasing bike parking.
- Tam HS encouraged to look at increasing secure bike parking, look at increasing safety corridor along Almonte (explore walk audit information)
- Tam Valley Explore traffic calming or sharrows on Marin Ave

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
